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HISTORY OF THE ST. GEORGE DISTRICT WOMEN'S AMATEUR ATHLETIC CLUB

Founded 1928

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THE EARLY YEARS

The St. George District Ladies' Amateur Athletic Club, with headquarters at Hurstville Oval, was formed in 1928 under the guidance of the St. George District Amateur Athletic Club, the captain, Alleyn Gainsford, being largely responsible for the formation. Throughout the ensuing years Mr. Gainsford maintained his interest in the Women's Club, always willingly giving any required assistance.

The First Members. In 1928, Edith Robinson, the first women athlete to represent Australia at an Olympic Games, returned from competing at the Olympic Games in Amsterdam, Holland, and, being a resident of the St. George district, it was fitting that she should become a foundation member together with Gladys Phillips, Nell Gould, Agnes Stapleton, Mavis Strachan, Milda Crispo, Marjorie Cope and Phyllis Matthews, all of whom achieved remarkable success in athletics. Gladys Phillips was appointed Club Secretary, and the first season produced a membership of 14.

In the early years women's athletics was purely an adult sport, and it was not until nearly 30 years later that competition on a club basis was provided for young girls.

Commencement of Competition. The first major events entered by Club members were the 1929 State Championships, conducted by the New South Wales Amateur Athletic Association. The Women's Association was not formed until nearly four years later.

These Championships were held at Manly Oval and with no bridge over the harbour the journey by small ferry could bring either delight or misery, depending upon the whims of nature. A rough crossing seriously affected the performances of some competitors. The years of rigid training and specialisation had not arrived, so the Championships were thoroughly enjoyed and friendships flourished.

The results of these Championships were very encouraging. Edie Robinson, still recovering from the effects of the long sea journey from Holland, (air travel was a long way into the future) finished 3rd in the Senior 50 yards and Nell Gould was narrowly beaten by Amy Smith (Botany) for first place in the Junior 50 yards. The 4x220 yards relay comprising Edie Robinson, Nell Gould, Gladys Phillips and Agnes Stapleton, considered a highlight of the Championships, was won easily and in the record time of 1m 53.2s.

The 1928/29 season saw the introduction of the first women's Inter-club competition, at University Oval. Four district clubs - Botany, Kensington, St. George and Western Suburbs entered, with St. George finishing second to the strong Kensington Club, which had the famous Winter sisters, Rosa and Irene among its members.

The first Dunn Shield competition in which women featured was held in 1929, and was the beginning of many close contests between Edie Robinson and Chrissie Dahm (Botany) the latter being, in 1931, the first Australian woman to break 12s for the 100 yards. Chrissie Dahm won the 100 yards title, but was beaten in the 220 yards by Edie Robinson. In the 80m hurdles, Nell Gould was narrowly beaten by the crack athlete Clarice Kennedy. (It is interesting to note that, apart from early experiments over 90 yards, the hurdles event has always been conducted over the metric distance).

Winners of the first Club Championships, held at Hurstville Oval in 1930 were:- Senior 100 yards - G. Phillips 11 4/5s (Record), Senior 220 yards - N. Gould 26.3s (Record), 60 yards hurdles - N. Gould 9s, Broad Jump - N. Gould 15'11", High Jump - N. Gould 4'4", Junior 100 yards - M. Strachan 12.7s.

Club members were again prominent in the 1930 State Championships with the following results:- Senior 100 yards - E. Robinson 2nd, G. Phillips 3rd, Senior 220 yards - E. Robinson 2nd, N. Gould 3rd. 80m Hurdles - N. Gould 2nd, Junior 75 yards - M. Strachan 3rd, Junior 100 yards - M. Strachan 3rd.

These performances, together with those of many promising youngsters, firmly established the Club in the athletic world.

Training. Training has always been considered necessary, although in the early years, in addition to two competition sessions, was limited to rarely more than one session each week. Earl Park, Arncliffe, (now an industrial area)

was the training venue. Coaches and trainers were virtually non-existent. All members worked together, but carried out individual training schedules, with the majority learning as much as possible about massage and leg injuries, in order to help each other when necessary. Free from the harsh routines which were later introduced, these training sessions were always something to look forward to enjoy.

As State Championships and other important fixtures approached some considered it of great advantage to train on the ground to be used, or some other ground, purely as a change from the normal venue. The Sydney Sports Ground was often used, and, as very few people possessed private transport, Club members walked from Central Station to the ground and back. In the late 29's and early 30's members had to travel through a notorious crime area, where 'razor gangs' operated nightly, but they always travelled en masse and were never at any time forced to accelerate.

An experiment was also carried out with early morning training. Led by Edie Robinson, a small band of Club members assembled near Fry's Paddock, Kogarah, at 6 a.m. several mornings each week for fast training on the adjacent road. This was terminated by area development.

Off Season Activities. During the early years the Club was fortunate in having a rather wonderful 'behind the scenes' worker in Miss Eileen Coghlan, a kind, motherly person. She was later appointed chaperone, and took a keen interest in all members. About this time, the Club considered it of vital importance to remain together during the winter months and to keep fit with another form of sport. Vigoro was then developing into a popular winter sport so the Club entered a team in the metropolitan competition. Miss Coghlan took charge of these activities, and the vigoro team played for several years, with considerable success. During one season a member of the team, Flo Gould, won the State trophy for outstanding performance in the field. The St. George Men's Club was always interested in the Club activities, and a former secretary, Mr. Bert Button, acted as scorer for the team.

The year 1931 became a crucial one for the Club. The loss of Milda Crispo, top high jumper, and the temporary absence of Nell Gould from competition was a severe blow.

At this stage, new clubs were being formed throughout the Metropolitan area and Edie Robinson and Gladys Phillips left St. George in order to form the South Sydney Club.

However, under the guidance of Nell Gould, 1932 saw the revival of the Club, and the emergence of Lillian Scott as State Junior Sprint Champion. This was also the year in which women athletes gained their independence by the formation of an Australian Women's Amateur Athletic Union and State Associations.

THE NINETEEN THIRTIES

The nineteen thirties commenced a new era in women's athletics. The formation of Women's State Associations and a National Union in 1932 meant that clubs would be administered entirely by women, and plans were well ahead for the first Women's Australian Athletic Championships, which were to be held biennially.

To conform with the requirements of the new State ruling body 'Women' replaced 'Ladies' in the name of the Club. Under the new regime Nell Gould became the Club Honorary Secretary with Kathleen McEvoy as Honorary Treasurer. Mrs. R.A. Reardon was appointed Patron of the Club, and Ada Gifford Chairman.

The first Women's Australian Championships were held in Melbourne in 1933 and the Club had one NSW representative — Nell Gould. Two former members, Edie Robinson and Gladys Phillips were also selected as members of the first State Team.

The Club regained its strength with such top athletes as Ada Gifford, Nell Gould, Frances Garvey, Jessie Reardon, May Vidler, Norma Chadwick, Norma Andresen, Anne Dee, Flo Gould and Mary McKenna. Other outstanding athletes included Kathleen and Eileen McEvoy, Mary and Jean Harvey, Elva Graham, Mona Walsh, Kath Sauer, Jeannette Harrison and the Collis sisters.

Jessie Reardon was an outstanding high jumper and broad jumper. With Clubmate Jeannette Harrison she was always a great attraction. Both schoolgirls, one blonde, one brunette, with waist length plaits, they were excellent stylists as they soared over the bar, 'pigtails' flying. In the 1935 Australian Championships in Brisbane when Nell Gould and Jessie Reardon were selected in the NSW team, Jessie, at 14 years of age, became the youngest competitor at an Australian Championships. The full import of this cannot be understood until it is realised that at the time only open Australian Championships were held. More than two decades were to pass before junior championships were introduced.

Ada Gifford was one of the 'great' club members. Always a top State sprinter, State Broad Jump Champion, and many times a State representative. She was considered unlucky to have missed selection in the 1938 Empire Games Team. Apart from her ability as an athlete, she gave tremendous administrative support to the Club and was Chairman for several years.

The 1936 State Team contained two members of the Club — Ada Gifford and Nell Gould. Frances Garvey, Ada Gifford and Nell Gould were members of the 1938 State Team.

May Vidler, whilst still a schoolgirl, became one of the State's best all-rounders. Unfortunately, Pentathlon Championships were then unknown. State Open 440 yards Champion, Broad Jump Champion, Javelin Champion and Junior Sprint Champion were among the State titles she collected.

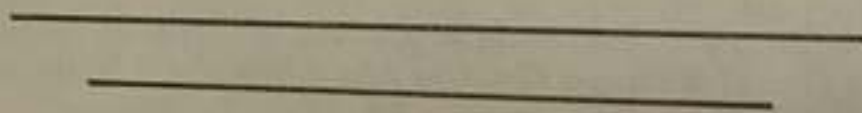
The Club held top State honours in 1936/37 and 1937/38 by winning the Inter-club and Angus and Coote Shield competitions in two successive seasons.

In 1938 Nell Gould was selected to represent Australia at the Empire Games in the 80 metres hurdles and broad jump events, thereby becoming the first member to represent the Club in International competition. History was made as her brother Harry, a member of the St. George Men's Club was also selected in the team for the Men's broad jump, thus making it the first time a male and female member of the same family had competed in a similar athletic event at any Games.

Assistance to Schools. In 1934, a representative of the St. George Girls' High School approached the Club with a request for assistance for their athletes . . . someone to take over entirely the training and selection of the girls and to help with carnivals. Nell Gould was asked to assist, and for twenty years, and on a voluntary basis, took complete charge of this section of the school sport, thus making the Club the first to give assistance to the education department. In later years, assistance became general.

This move by the school had a tremendous impact upon Club membership and strength, and a strong bond developed between school and Club. Top school athletes automatically became members of the Club, the school for many years enjoyed the position of Combined High School Premiers, and the Club acquired future Olympians and world record holders as members.

Among the vast number of recruits from the school were Gladys Phillips, Lillian Scott (State Junior Sprint Champion), Pauline Skellon, Marian Diamond, Alison and Jill McCusker, Barbara McGovern, May Vidler (State Sprint, Middle Distance, Broad Jump and Javelin Champion) Pat Greacen, Fleur Mellor (Olympic Gold Medallist) and Betty McReavie (World 80m Hurdles Record Holder).



THE NINETEEN FORTIES

The nineteen forties were the sad war years when National and many State Championships were abandoned and the Club was held together by those who were too young, or for other reasons precluded from entering the armed services, and in the 1945/46 season it became necessary for the Club to combine with Canterbury/Bankstown for inter-club competition. By hard work and loyalty, this band of competitors kept the Club going until normal conditions were resumed. One wonders just how many members may have gained National or International representation had the war not intervened.

In 1940 Norma Chadwich became the State's leading walker and the first of many Club members to excel at this section of athletics. She graduated from the Junior to the Senior Ranks winning every title and remaining unbeaten for seven years, a record which still stands.

The Club won 1940/41 A Grade Inter-club honours, and the 1940 Australian Championships in Perth when Nell Gould was State Team Manager, coach and a member of the world record breaking relay, were the last major events for eight years.

In 1948, former Club members Gladys Phillips (Mrs. G. Gosling) and Mrs. Mabel Lawrence returned as officials. Together with competitors Betty Lukins as Club Secretary and Jacqueline Baumann (Mrs. D. Montague), later to become Club Treasurer, that year provided tremendous strength in the administrative section.

Sub/junior events for competitors under sixteen years of age were introduced in 1949.

By the end of the nineteen forties the Club was once again in a strong position with Secretary Betty Lukins as leading State sprinter and many of the following girls – Pam Gray, Norma Lincoln, Marian Diamond, Barbara McGovern, Joyce Lane, Dawn Bulfin, Margaret MacNeill, Joan Saint, Jacqueline Baumann, Margaret Dane and Beverley Hill already on the threshold of National and International competition. Membership had increased to 58.

THE NINETEEN FIFTIES

This decade proved to be one of the most successful in the Club's long history, producing three Olympic and Three Commonwealth Games Representatives (including an Olympic Gold Medallist and Commonwealth Bronze Medallist), three Australian Champions, 14 State Representatives, two World, one Australian and 12 State Record Holders, 33 State Champions and 77 place-getters, and the Club won A & B Grade Inter-Club Premierships in 3 consecutive years.

With so many brilliant athletes, the Club had formidable strength in every section. Among the most outstanding members during this period of general brilliance were Fleur Mellor (Olympic Gold Medallist and World Record Holder); Beverly Watson (Commonwealth Games Bronze Medallist and Australian High Jump Champion); Jacqueline Baumann (Empire Games Representative and Australian High Jump Champion); Joyce Lane (Australian Junior Shot Put Record Holder and State Representative). Pam Gray, Joan Dronfield, Joan Saint and Pat Greacen (State Representatives); Betty McReavie, Betty Lukins, Lorraine Simpson, Elaine Keats and Pat Stephens.

In 1954, following her return from Vancouver where she coached the successful Australian Commonwealth Games Team, Nell Gould retired after 26 years of top competition, and devoted her time to coaching and administration. In 1956, when sectional manager of the Australian Olympic Games Team, she became the only person to coach a winning Olympic Games Athletic Relay for Australia.

After more than a quarter of a century of summer track and field, winter cross-country for women was introduced in 1950. The Club was fortunate in having the extremely pleasant facilities of Scarborough Park National Fitness ground at its disposal. Used primarily as a means of preparing athletes for the summer competition, the Club also organised Inter-club cross country events.

The popularity and expansion of women's athletics necessitated the inclusion of additional events and sections. In 1957, the Pentathlon (200m 80m Hurdles, shot, long and high jumps) was held for the first time, and one wonders how the brilliant all-rounders of former years — Nell Gould, May Vidler and Jacqueline Baumann would have fared in this event.

The Club acquired many excellent officials, in particular Mrs. Frances Poynter, and top athletes Margaret MacNeill, Jacqueline Baumann and Beverley Watson also carried out the arduous tasks of Club administrators.

In 1954, a second generation of athletes appeared in the Club. Beverley Payne (daughter of Edie Robinson-Payne) and Barbara Gosling (daughter of Gladys Phillips-Gosling) became members. Although their mothers were Champion sprinters, both girls were field games exponents.

By the end of 1959 membership had increased to 87.

THE NINETEEN SIXTIES

For the second time in history area progress and development adversely affected the Club, and by 1960 plans were well ahead for the formation of a Women's Amateur Athletic Club at Sutherland.

Unfortunately, the majority of outstanding Club members and possible recruits resided in the area south of the St. George's River and close to Sutherland.

Although a heavy blow to Club strength, transfers were amicable, and officers were invited to occupy honorary positions with the proposed Sutherland Club. A former Club Secretary, Mrs. J. Keats, became Sutherland's first President. In effect, the Sutherland Women's Amateur Athletic Club was formed by this Club.

This move resulted in the 1960's becoming an era of rebuilding. It takes many years to develop an athlete, and with so many young members left, time and patience were needed, but, as the years passed, the Club was rewarded.

At the 1960 Australian Championships in Hobart, Lola Rivett became the National Junior 100 yards Champion. Other State representatives during this period were Jane Carlisle (Jnr. Javelin), Mary Whitefield (Jnr. and Open Cross Country), Bernadette Jeacle (1 Mile Walk) and Monica Pegg (Jnr. 100m, 200, and relay).

After the 1962 titles, Australian Championships were held annually, giving members more opportunities for State representation. In an ever-changing world, the metric system was introduced in 1968.

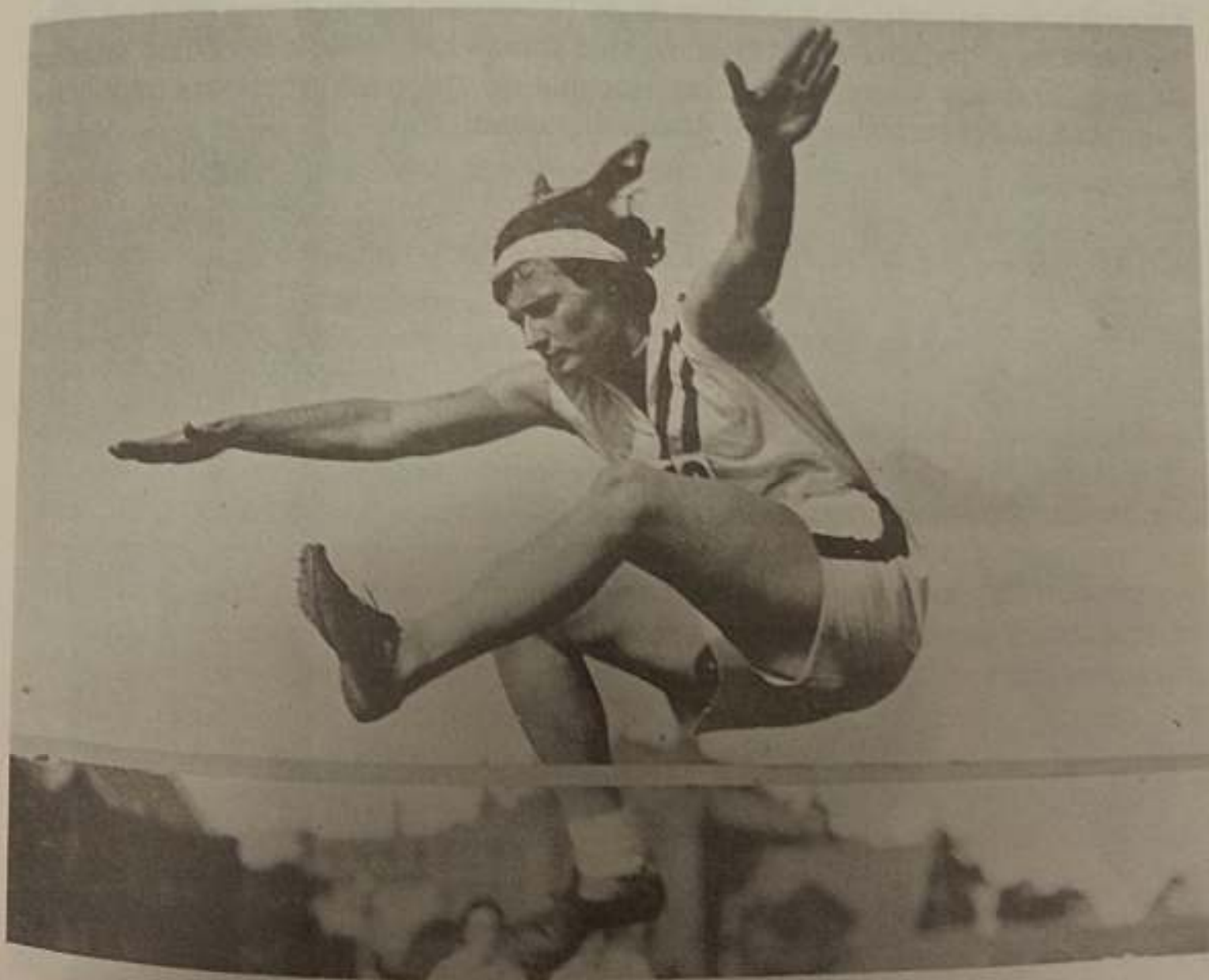
A 'family affair' developed during the 'sixties'. The Gorman sisters, Sandra and Pamela became members, and their parents Mr. & Mrs. A. Gorman gave valuable assistance to the Club. Maureen Patmore was a great asset as a competitor and official, and her father Mr. Roy Patmore gave tremendous help in the coaching field. Then came identical twins Coral and Rhonda Wells to thoroughly confuse officials; twins Marilyn and Patricia Rae; Jenelle Montague (daughter of the Club's Hon. Treasurer, Mrs. Jacqueline Montague), and finally the entire Avery family. George Avery, runner-up in the hop, step and jump (now called the triple jump) at the 1948 Olympic Games in London, enrolled his three daughters - Jennifer, Robyn and Pamela - all good athletes. Mrs. Gwen Avery was later appointed Honorary Secretary, and Mr. George Avery Long Jump Coach. The future will tell if this generation can emulate the performance of their parents.

Some of the most outstanding members during this period were:-
Lola Rivett, Lola Swartz, Michele Blood, Jane Carlisle, Bernadette Jeacle, Mary Whitefield, Sue Williams, Sandra Hancock (Gorman), Jennifer Avery, Helen Taylor (Care), Jeanette Scroop, Monica Pegg and Kerry Evans.

THE NINETEEN SEVENTIES

With the commencement of a new decade, a return to A Grade status, and a membership of 82, the Club is once again in a strong position. The return, after an absence of 17 years, of former shot put champion and Australian Record Holder, Joyce Lane (Mrs. Hallett), still a formidable competitor, and an excellent coach, will boost the field games section. State Representative and Junior Sprint Champion Monica Pegg; State Sub Junior Sprint Champion Kerry Evans, Joyce Hallett, Diane Ryan, Jennifer and Robin Avery, Marilyn and Patricia Rae, Karen Butler and Catherine McIlhoney are among the members who should lead the Club into a successful 'seventies'.

CLUB UNIFORMS

Over the years, competition uniforms of the Club have not undergone any radical changes in design. The original uniform of 1928 was a white tussore sleeveless one-piece romper style with self belt, a red ribbon bow at the neckline and a one-inch red stripe at each side of the leg section. A matching headband was also worn.

In 1933, the new State Controlling body ruled that all competitors wear black shorts, and the Club uniform was then changed to a white sleeveless singlet with the Club emblem on the front and black shorts with a one-inch red stripe down each side. Except for a change, in 1950, to red shorts with a white stripe at the sides and a slight decrease in the length, the Club uniform was remained much the same for nearly 40 years.

In 1929, at an inter-club match at the Mascot cinder track, Edie Robinson caused a sensation by wearing the first track suit seen in Australia, although this had been part of the Northern Hemisphere scene for some years. Almost identical with the track suits of the present day, it was referred to in the press as a 'pyjama suit'. Prior to this somewhat historic occasion, athletes did not wear any warm, protective clothing on the track, therefore frequently competed under rather cold and distressing conditions.
