ATHLETICS. BOTANY TRIUMPH. Club's Four Victories. NOVICE CHAMPIONSHIP. Botany Harriers' long-distance members on Saturday gave a display reminiscent of past glories in the days when the club was supreme in crosscountry and winter racing. For some years the tam has occupied an obscure position, but new officials of the club, co-operating with senior longdistance runners, succeeded in oringing the representatives again into prominence.

Individual and teams' honours were attained by Botany men in the 18th race for the five miles novice cross-country championship of New South Wales, promoted by the East Sydney Club at Kensington racecourse on Saturday, and a quartette of successes was completed by winning the five miles senior open handicap and fastest time honours. J. Patterson, who last year collapsed within a mile of the finish, obliterated W. J. Hyland's record of 29m 17s, created in 1929, winning by nine seconds in 27m 50s. Botany won the team honours for the first time since 1924, although they had seven previous successes. A, Rogers, also of Botany, secured the five miles senior open handicap, and his club mate, H. Hayden, registered the fastest time.

Of an entry of 83, 63 runners competed. Botany, East Sydney, Kensington, St. George, South Sydney, and Western Suburbs provided full teams with individual nominations from Maniy, Newcastle, and Northern Suburbs. It was the second year that the race was held at Kensington. The course comprised nine furlongs on the main track, thence along the hills surrounding the eastern and southern sides, another lap on the track, followed by a second run around the slopes and finishing with a circuit of the course proper.

When the runners lined up at the two furlongs post individual competitors were alloited the inside position, St. George team drew second place, with Western Suburos, South Sydney, Kensington, and East Sydney in that order, and Botany on the outside. The Kensington quartette, sington, and East Sydney in that order, and Botany on the outside. The Kensington quartette, Simpson, Wills, Fell, and Stevens, piloted the field along the straight on the main racing track, a circuit of which was completed. As they passed the stands for the second time the order was Wills, Stevens, Birrell, and Patterson. Leaving the course proper the runners moved

Leaving the course proper the runners moved up the hill to the north-east corner of the ground led by Wills, Birrell, Patterson, and McAlister. Birrell assumed the lead around the hilly country at the back of the course, and when they again reached the straight he was slightly in advance of Patterson. Bowman, of Newcastle, had then moved into third place, and Wood was nearest of the others. On the tan track with one lap of the course to cover Birrell had a few yards' advantage on Patterson, a hundred yards ahead of Wood, followed by Fullarton. The Botany man moved away from Birrell, and as he raced around the track further increased his advantage. Birrell failed to respond, and Patterson beat him by about 50 yards in 27m 50s. Wood was 36 seconds behind Birrell, beating Fullarton by 14 seconds for third place. The merit of Patterson's achievement may be gauged by the fact that his time surpassed the course record by 1m 27s. The first eleven men also had better figures, an indication that the novice runners on Saturday were superior to those of last year. It is also worthy of note that Patterson and Birrell ran the Journey fester than the best of the runners engaged in the senior open race on the same course.

In an interesting teams' race Botany won with 31 points. As in many similar races, the club finishing the first four men required to complete a team did not secure the leading position. Kensington had the number in before Botany, but the latter's places in the race when totalled gave the Botany men an advantage of eight points over Kensington and Western Suburbs, each team with 39 points being equal. Under international rules Western Suburbs gains second place by reason of the club's first man finishing in front of a Kensington runner.

St. George had won the teams' race for the previous five years, but failed badiy on Saturday. The club was fully represented by 17 men. yet finished last; whilst Botany had the smallest number of nine, an example of quality prevailing over quantity. South Sydney's team, with 44 points, was in fourth place.

R. Oxley, of Western Suburbs, prevented Botany men gaining all honours of the day by annexing the scaled handicap. His club also secured third place, and Kensington men filled second and fourth positions.

Botany Harriers, by winning the five miles open handicap for runners not engaged in the championship, and securing fastest time honours, opened their list of victories. This event was decided

ship, and securing fastest time honours, opened their list of victories. This event was decided prior to the novice race, and attracted 33 starters. Limit man P. James, on the 5m 15s mark, did not start, and the first man despatched was the veteran. A. B. Stephens, of South Sydney, who had an allow-ance of 4m 55s. State champion M. J. Mackenzie. of Western Suburbs, was on scratch. Stephens held command until two laps were to be covered. when he was overhauled by A. Rogers, of Botany. Rogers passed the stands, with seven furlongs to run. in advance of W. Pearce, and Stephens retired in the straight. J. Cramsie moved into third place. In the final stages Rogers maintained his in the straight. J. Cramsie moved into third place. In the final stages Rogers maintained his position, and beat Cramsie by five seconds, with V. Siy 27 seconds behind in third place. H. Hayden, of Botany, who has reached the stage where many other runners would have been long since retired, gave a glimpse of past form by finishing ninth and securing fastest time, 28m 18s. The winner's time was 57 seconds slower than Hayden's and Mactime was 57 seconds slower than Hayden's, and Mac-kenzie, second fastest, recorded 28m 26s.
