NOVICE TITLE WIN A · RECORD

Frank O'Hanlon yesterday won the State novice five-mile across country championship in 27 minutes, equalling the novice record for the Ramsgate course.

John Plummer of Western Suburbs holds the record which he put up in winning the Novice Championship last year.

Twenty-four year old O'Hanlon (St. George), is one of the most promising cross-country runners in the State.

He will compete in the State 10,000 metre cross-country championship over the Campbelltown course on Saturday week.

O'Hanlon won the Novice Championship by 200 yards from Botany runner Jack Whitham, who was a strong favourite for the event.

O. Redman, of Botany, was third.

O'Hanlon ran for four miles with the leaders of the race, judging his time to move away after ing his time to move away after the final crossing of the creek.

He broke away to a hundred yards lead, continued to increase it around the lake, and finished with a good solid sprint.

Ruled Out

Six Eastern Suburbs runners were ruled out of competing in the Novice Championship.

They were: Arthur Dye, Don Dymott, Mat Manning, Jack Connolly, Ron Cooper and Geoff Smith.

Eastern Suburbs race secretary, Noel Harrod, failed to post the entries in time; he missed the post by an hour.

Association race secretary, Mr. Neil Dickinson, said that he got the entries from the Eastern Suburbs Club on June 28.

The ruling of the Harriers Committee is that the entry should be in twelve days before the race and not later than 6 p.m. on the date, June 27.

Two South Sydney entrants, Carl Hallman and Harry Webb, were also refused permission to compete in the race.

The referee of the novice

championship, Mr. Bill Ahern, ruled Hallman and Webb out because they had competed in Tramway Transport races last Wednesday. Wednesday.

They were warned by the Harriers' Committee that they would be ruled as professionals if they started in the Tramway Transport road races.

Another South Sydney runner, Alan Jones, also started in the Newtown Tramway road race, but was not an entrant for yesterday's championship.

He also will be ruled a professional.

Change Mooted

After the novice championship yesterday the Harriers' Committee voted against a move to hold the State 10,000 metres crosscountry championship on an alternative venue to the Campbelltown course already decided upon.

Clubs have been asked to make arrangements for transporting entrants to Campbelltown on Saturday week.
